

Note from The Head

We know this year has been challenging for families and the community in many ways. In recent weeks, The Ramsey Academy community has once again showed how important it is to support each other.

Following the announcement that Mr Leys, had passed away after losing his long battle with cancer, the support, kindness, and many messages of condolences have provided comfort to his family, friends and colleagues. The messages on the school Facebook page indicate the esteem in which he was regarded and the impact he had on many people's lives.

Mr Leys was proud to be a part of the Ramsey community. He worked at the school for 15 years as Deputy Headteacher and more recently as Head of School. Whilst he was a teacher of Physical Education by training, he regularly taught other lessons including maths, English & PSHE. This was often done to ensure students were taught by someone they knew rather than a supply teacher. He was not a specialist in these areas but worked to deliver high quality lessons that allowed students to gain knowledge and confidence in their ability.

Mr Leys was a key member in developing our school culture and ethos. He encouraged every student to adopt our aim of 'be the best you can be'. Everything he did was for the students, even if this meant an inconvenience for himself. There are too many examples to list, but the students recognised this. It has been humbling to receive messages from students offering to organise fundraising activities for charity, memorial events and arranging a 'remembrance clap' on the field the day following the news of his death.

Mr Leys was proud of what we have achieved for the local community. His contribution to achieving our goal of being "an outstanding school in the heart of the community" cannot be underestimated. As a member of the local community, living locally, he understood the need for a school with a positive reputation that would cater for all the children in the area, irrespective of the ability or interests. Whilst most students make the right behaviour choices, there are others that need more support. Mr Leys always took the time to work with individuals and their families to help develop the sense of responsibility required to be part of the community.

At the appropriate time we will work with the students to arrange a series of events to remember Mr Leys' contribution to the school and local community.

Developing the correct culture and ethos has been an important part of our work. We want to be inclusive and for all students to be successful. We aim to provide students with a broad range of experiences during their time at Ramsey. This not only includes academic lessons but the wider aspects of school life that are so important to the overall educational experience in preparation for lifelong learning.

Each year group has a planned "Learning Journey" which builds on the experiences of the previous year. To compliment qualifications, we encourage students to complete the "Ramsey Achievement Award". Specific details of both these aspects of school life are outlined in this newsletter. We appreciate many of the normal activities have been suspended due to the pandemic, but we are gradually reintroducing a range of extra-curricular activities.

We are constantly reviewing our provision for the students. One of the latest initiatives is the development of a Well-being Garden and Re-wilding Project. Take the time to read the information about his project and if you feel you may be able to support in any way, please contact Mrs Perrins.

Congratulations to all those in Year 10, who have been selected to be part of the new Student Management Team. Providing leadership opportunities is important for young people's self-confidence and allows them to be active participants improving the provision in school.



Ramsey Achievement Award

The Ramsey Achievement Award (RAA) encourages students to strive to achieve in all aspects of Academy life. It purposefully sets high aspirational targets to achieve which will not only lead to academic qualifications but the development of life skills for future employment and high self-esteem. The RAA complements and is an integral part of the year based Ramsey Learning Journey.

To achieve the RAA students have to fulfil the following criteria:

- 96%+ attendance
- Make at least expected progress in English, Maths and six other subjects
- Complete the Personal Development activities

There are four levels of the RAA:





Quay Theatre Summer School

All necessary Covid Safety regulations will be adhered to at the time of the Course throughout the Quay building and the Jetty building to ensure optimum safety for children and tutors.

A chance to learn and refine performance skills in acting, movement and music through classes, workshops and performance. We have expanded the age range and will allow 8 and 9 year olds to attend. We are also expanding the number of performances from two to three because of the current restrictions on audience numbers, so the Summer School will run an extra day on the Saturday.

CLASSES: There will be a number of general acting and movement classes to develop more awareness of

- •General acting techniques, body language and gesture
 •The dynamic range of the voice
 •Creating a character and learning improvisation techniques
 •Stage discipline and creativity and working as a team

WORSHOPS: In addition to the general classes, there will be four 75 minute workshops concentrating on specific aspects of theatre performance. These will be split into different age groups. The four workshop titles include:

Improvisation Movement and mime Voice and Sounds Puppetry (using giant puppets)

PERFORMANCES: This year we let our imaginations run riot and wonder What Ifimagining what might have occurred if something had or had not happened. For example, imagine the world now if the Internet had never been invented, if animals could talk or if everyone carried on normal life as though they were still on Zoom calls! There will be THREE performances (because of likely Covid restrictions on audience numbers) and they will take place on Friday at 7.00pm and Saturday 2.30pm and 6.30pmon the Quay Theatre stage. All the students will be involved in the performance and have opportunities to sing, dance and act. Tickets for the show will be on sale for £ 6.00 Adult and £4.00 Child, each.lt should be noted that this is a workshop performance –not a finished product –and aims to demonstrate the skills learnt during the week.

Year 7 Science Club



This term we have been running a programme that is part of Survival STEM challenge, a set of three programmes exploring science, technology, engineering and maths in survival scenarios. Can you survive a zombie apocalypse? This is our theme for this term's Science Club. The programme investigates how design and technology can help students survive a zombie apocalypse – from making a barricade to keep them out, designing pressure pads to detect Zombie invaders, communicating with other survivors using Morse code and much more.

Year 9 Holocaust Docufilm

Year 9 have recently begun exploring the Holocaust in their History lessons. As part of their lessons all of Year 9 have watched a docufilm produced by Holocaust Learning UK called 'Out of the Darkness.' As Holocaust Memorial Day fell during lockdown this docufilm was produced to ensure pupils still had the opportunity to hear from a holocaust survivor. The film followed the experiences of Janine Webber who was born in Poland in 1932 and experienced the full horrors of life in a ghetto before being hidden by various people and finally securing a position as a maid after assuming the identity of a Catholic orphan.





The film allowed pupils to see how the program of persecution and discrimination escalated from 1933 when the Nazis came to power to the final solution being implemented. The film drew on many different first hand accounts and was extremely thought provoking. The film also linked the holocaust to the genocides which have occurred post 1945. Mrs Perrins

Well-being Garden and re-wilding project

During lockdown the benefits of getting in touch with nature have become very evident. The benefits of being in the garden run much deeper than just exercise. A King's Fund report on the health benefits of gardening were found to be broad and diverse, with research studies showing significant reductions in depression and anxiety and improved social functioning. As a result we have embarked on a project to develop a well-being garden for pupils. The pupils will be able to spend time in the garden and to become involved with its development and maintenance. The garden will be an ongoing project but it is planned to begin after May Half Term. We would be very grateful for any suitable plant donations or any large pots you have spare if you would like to support the project. Donations can be left at Reception or given to any of the teachers in Humanities.



In partnership with the Well-being garden we have also begun the first steps to re-wild some of our grass areas at school.

Pupils may have noticed we have stopped mowing around the buildings to create a wildlife corridor and have also stopped mowing the triangles. The plan is to allow wild flowers to thrive and to create valuable habitat for insects. The area has already started to look more natural and hopefully as term progresses we will see more and more wild flowers blooming. In the autumn we hope to add to the bio-diversity by planting wildflower seeds.

After May Half Term there will be an Eco Club starting run by Mrs Perrins and Miss Hilton. Further details will be published soon.





Congratulations to Sophie - 7D1 and Katie - 9A2 who won last half term's competitions! We hope you enjoyed your prizes!



We are also continuing the 'Returned Book' raffle. We hope this will encourage all students to return their library books! Again, one lucky student will be a winner!





We have a fantastic summer holiday volunteering opportunity for students aged 14 and over with Essex Libraries.

Essex Libraries are inviting students aged 14 and over to volunteer in their local library during the summer holidays. Their role will be to encourage children to participate in the annual Summer Reading Challenge and talk to them about the books they are reading. Students can use this opportunity to gain work experience within their community and they can put the volunteering hours towards Youth Award Schemes such as Duke of Edinburgh. Volunteering will help them gain new skills and self-confidence.

Essex Libraries ask volunteers to volunteer for a minimum of 18 hours, although they are welcome to offer to do more hours if they wish.
