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Editors' Notes





Training Expedition D of E Experience.

Firstly, The Duke of Edinburgh (D of E) is an award that you can achieve by taking part in various activities and completing them. You also have to attend two expeditions; for the first expedition your teachers decide where and how they are going to teach you the skills you will need. The second expedition is the expedition you will get assessed on and you can show your personal progress. It is a very good thing to be able to say you have done and put on your CV. Also, employers are always looking for people who have done extra things outside of the school curriculum, such as Duke of Edinburgh award as it demonstrates a wide variety of skills. When we arrived, the teachers gave us boxes which contained our tents and the other accessories we needed and showed us how to put up the tents. Then, we got given maps and felt-tip pens and worked in groups to mark our 3 check points (on the maps). Next the teachers showed us how to use our compasses and one teacher joined each group to monitor our behaviour and watch how we tackled the task we were given. When we arrived at our check point, the teacher who was helping us left us to work together and carrying on by ourselves.

When we arrived at the camp, we had a few hours spare to look around and relax. The year 10s came and some of the year 9 students who couldn't fit into the year 9 groups. Ramsey Students Speak Out at the North Essex Regional Final

The Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge was created and is held by a collaboration between the SpeakersTrust and the Jack Petchey Foundation. It aims to ensure that young people have the confidence and skills to speak aloud, and that they know the importance of their voice and why they deserve to be heard. Through public speaking sessions with specialists from the Speakers Trust, students in Year 10 can develop key attributes with their peers and learn what makes a good speech. Of course, content of a speech is very important, but the way a speech is delivered is key as well - which is where mentors from the Speakers Trust come in. In their sessions, students learn how to make memorable speech about a topic they are passionate about, focusing on key ideas such as hand gestures, posture, eye contact and movement as they deliver a short speech in front of their peers.

From these sessions, each school chooses representatives who will improve their speeches and compete in the appropriate regional final. From the Ramsey Academy, the two representatives were myself (Tazmin Sloat) and Max Felton. After school on Thursday 9th May, we went to New Rickstones Academy in Witham, where this year's North Essex Regional Final was held. As the competition was due to start at half past six, we had a couple of hours in which a final session was held. In this session, all the contestants got to know each a little better and small final adjustments were made to the delivery of our speeches, making sure that we conveyed our passion and engaged the audience effectively. After that, it was time for the competition to start.

All the speeches made on the evening were spectacular: it was clear to see that the judges would have a hard time deciding a winner. My speech, titled 'E for Education' was about the importance of education and what I had realised through my work on the Send My Friend School Campaign whereas Max's speech, 'Genders' was on gender equality and why it is everyone's right to make sure men and women are treated in an equal manner. There were a wide variety of topics discussed on the night, for example, there were some particularly memorable speeches on body image, positivity and peer pressure. Rumbidzai Kawome, from New Rickstones Academy, was this year's winner, with her speech on loving herself despite her differences in relation to her peers.

I really enjoyed the competition – the energy was positive, and it highlighted the power people can have, even if they have been told time and time again that they are not allowed to use their voice. To those of you in the future who will participate in the sessions, I suggest that you fully immerse yourself and make the most of it – you don't realise quite how important it is to be able to speak to people you've never spoken to before.

I'm a year 11, and my GCSE's are getting way too close. I know how important they are but I just cannot find the motivation to revise, I keep on procrastinating.


Dear Anonymous,
