Halstead Boxing Club Review



Firstly, location: the Halstead Boxing Club is on the same road as the car garage between the Large Coop and the Fire Station. It is in a large warehouse, with a sort of reception desk in a well-lit room for an

entrance. It costs £3 for a session for teenagers, which takes roughly 1 hour and 15 minutes, which is from 17:45 until 19:00. For adults, the session is £5 and is 2 hours long, taking place directly




after the teenagers' session, 19:00 until 21:00. For some, this is an inconvenient time, specifically for adults with early jobs. However, it may be a better time to take place as the difficulty of the exercises, specifically at the start, are too exhausting to take place directly after school hours. It is wise to rest and fill your stomach slightly before taking part in the exhausting exercises. On to the exercises themselves. If you are to arrive at 17:45, then there will be about 10-15 minutes of severely exhausting pulse raisers, like jogging around the warehouse, jumping or touching the floor when instructed to, and sprinting. Afterwards, you'd do about five minutes of stretching before moving onto the worst part of the session - skipping. Skipping is the most exhausting exercise, and is in my opinion, the least fun exercise. However, afterwards, is where the boxing part begins, so it is worthwhile getting through. The boxing part is usually either shadow boxing, non-contact sparring, punching bags, or a constant change between exercises such as push ups, and punching bags. However, the coaches always (usually) find a way to make every session different, which is fun, but can be difficult if you are bad at a specific part (like push ups).

Some members are allowed to spar with other members in the boxing rings, but not to the point of knock out.

The coaches do an amazing job at teaching different styles and techniques and are overall very motivated, as they seem to really enjoy the sport, but they are also friendly and easy to talk to. If you are a new member, then they would talk to you and ask about your life (in a friendly way), and would go somewhat easy on you for that session, but only that session. The atmosphere is so friendly that even some of the adults will sometimes help the younger members without any pay or outside motivation. On top of that, the club isn't only for males, as females turn up to both the teenagers' and adults' sessions.

Overall, I would give the boxing club an 8.5/10, it would be a 9 if not for the skipping, and a 10 if it were a little earlier. I love the atmosphere of the club, as the coaches really do their jobs to the best of their ability, and try to push people way past what they thought were their limits. By Yakup O and Lucas H

Ypres Belgium Trip

The Ypres trip was a two-day trip -12th and 13th of November – where we learned about the First World War (WW1) and the impact it had on the different countries and how they respected their armies and soldiers.

12th of November:

The first place we visited was the Trench of Death, Diksmuide, which was where the Belgium people fought in WW1. The Germans had set up base near the Ijzer river, and it was heavily armed with machine guns and dangerous weaponry. In 1915(whilst under heavy fire) Belgium soldiers started digging a trench along the west bank of the river to try to retake the base and both sides got closer and closer still they were only yards apart.

The next place we went to was Lijssenthoek Cemetery, where mainly the French and British soldiers were buried. The French graves were white marble crosses that stood up tall and the British graves were arched white marble that stood tall and the reason why both graves were made of white marble and stood up right because these countries were fighting for their countries against the attacking side. There is about 10,000 graves in the Lijssenthoek Cemetery.

We also visited Bayernwald trenches which was the German trenches, they were quite different to the Belgium ones because the German ones have lines of wood entwined together along the sides of the trenches.

Later in the day, we watched the Last Post ceremony at Menin Gate. All along the walls was just some of the names of soldiers who's name tags were found but no bodies. Soldiers marched up Menin Gate and people laid down wreaths.

13th of November:

We visited the Zonnebeke Museum, part of the museum focuses on the tragedy of the Third Battle of Ypres, the problem for the Allies in their attempt to break through the German front line and the part played by the different nations in The Battle of Passchendaele 1917. The museum led to the dugouts (which is a replica of the underground trenches during the war) which showed headquarters, accommodation, workshop, communication room and first aid post.

Next, we travelled to Langemark Cemetery, where the German soldiers laid. The German graves weren't white marble and didn't stand up tall, they were quite flat on the ground and were made

of black marble instead. This was because the Germans started the war so even though the soldiers fought for, they country and died for their country, they didn't think it was right to have the same graves for the countries that fought because they were attacked and they country that started the war in the first place

Then we visited Tyne Cot Cemetery, which laid more of the defending side of WW1. Also, all along the wall at the back wall was more of the soldiers who's name tags were found but with no body, which couldn't find their names in Menin Gate. Tyne Cot was a name applied to a farm building which stood near the level crossing on the road from Passchendaele to Broodseinde. There are now more than 11.900 Commonwealth servicemen of the First World War buried or commemorated in Tyne Cot Cemetery.



Soon following we visited Essex Farm, more quiet young soldiers were laid to rest. There was even a very young boy who actually signed up at the age 15, he walked about 15 miles to join the army and they asked his age and he said 15 so they told him to go back home and comeback tomorrow and so he walked the whole way back home. He travelled all the way again the next day and they asked his age like before but this time he answered with 18 and they gave him the uniform and let him sign up and fight, and he died before his 16th birthday.



The last historical place we visited was Hill 60. It is called Hill 60 because it is 60 metres above sea level. The launch of a British attack on 17th April 1915 began with the explosion of three mines which literally blew the top off the hill. Hundreds of soldiers lost their lives on this small area of ground at that time.

Overall, I thought the Ypres trip was a really good experience and I think anyone who hasn't been to any of the places should really go because it is such an eye opener to what it was really like for soldiers and families at the time of World War One and how much it effect their lives as a whole. By actually going to the trenches and the graves, you can understand the whole experience a lot better and really see it for yourselves (instead of just reading it out of a textbook). By Courtney S


"Anne, good to see you are awake" says an ominous voice as a dark figure begins to approach me.


