The £200 award has paid for a computerised irrigation system for the new polytunnel.'Anglia In Bloom' judges visited us to see our site. The judges were the same as last year and they could clearly see how much we had expanded our site. They also applauded our response to the damage to the polytunnel. Good luck to 'Halstead In Bloom' in this regional competition.

We are in a good position for next term and will aim to nurture hundreds of plants over the winter. New members will always be welcome. We also wish Mrs Bolt, who has helped out supervising the club, best of luck with her new job in Hedingham.
